Many more people will need Beatitudes Center DOAR's compassionate help with the rapidly growing aging population. I am honored and excited to share that we launched three major initiatives in 2007 that will help us meet the ever-growing demand for our vital services.

- We were selected as one of five charities to participate in the Arizona Endowment Building Initiative. Through this 18 month program, we are developing the groundwork to build a much stronger endowment fund.
- The Virginia G. Piper Charitable Trust and the National Council on Aging selected Beatitudes Center DOAR to participate in the "Maricopa Models of Significant Service" initiative. Through this project we are involving volunteers – especially those over age 55 – in significant leadership positions that will strengthen our capacity to serve. Our strategies will serve as a model for other nonprofits.
- The late Frances McClelland, a long-time Beatitudes Center DOAR supporter, established The Emerald Foundation through her estate planning. This sparkling foundation awarded a five-year grant to help us build awareness about our vital cause. Through better awareness, we will reach more volunteers and supporters... and therefore bring compassionate help to more people in need.

Homebound Adults

VICaP Faith in Action helps homebound adults – older adults and those with disabilities – live in their own homes as long as possible. Volunteers are recruited and trained to provide free services that include grocery shopping, transportation to medical and social service appointments, friendly visits and phone calls, home repairs, business help, computer assistance, respite, and home safety assessments. Insurance coverage is provided for each volunteer. The program serves Phoenix, Fountain Hills, Glendale, Litchfield Park, Paradise Valley, Peoria, and Scottsdale.

Accomplishments in 2007

- 38,846 hours of direct and indirect service were provided by volunteers
- 4,862 one-way trip escorts were provided to medical/social service appointments
- 145 neighbors received holiday gifts
- 89 Thanksgiving dinners were delivered to neighbors
- 188 new volunteers were trained (for a total of 5,099 since the program's inception)
- 432 new neighbors called in with service requests
- 749 neighbors received help from compassionate volunteers



Nell and Susan have grown close through their weekly shopping trips.

A vibrant employee at age 88, Nell Wamsley was at work one morning last year when she fell. Nell hit her head on the cement floor. Not feeling well soon after, Nell called her daughter to take her to the nearby emergency room. The fall was so severe that it caused a subdural hematoma to Nell's brain. After life-threatening surgery and weeks in the hospital, Nell's determined spirit pulled her through.

Back in her own home and living alone, Nell's daughter contacted Beatitudes Center DOAR's volunteer program, VICaP Faith in Action, to

see if her mom could be matched with a volunteer who could take her mom shopping as she could no longer drive.

Susan Gilfeather was matched with Nell to assist her with grocery shopping, just weeks after becoming a volunteer. Susan was following her husband's lead, as he had provided dedicated volunteer service through the program for many years.

The two ladies have a standing appointment every Wednesday morning for their shopping trip. They have developed a wonderful relationship. Susan shares, *"Nell is definitely a joy! I have learned a lot from her."* Susan calls Nell the butterfly lady because she has never seen Nell without a butterfly pin someplace on her clothing. When asked why she does this Nell replied that *"butterflies are a beautiful symbol of hope."* Nell's gratitude is clear when she praises Susan: *"She is a good and wonderful choice for my volunteer."*

Our "neighbors" are deeply appreciative of the services that volunteers provide which allow them to remain in their own homes. Our staff is proud to create magical connections every day between inspiring neighbors and volunteers who say "yes" to the call to serve.

Congregational Health Programs

Nurse & Health Ministries Network assists congregations to develop and maintain effective health and healing programs most frequently led by a parish or faith community nurse. These programs serve to enhance health in mind, body, and spirit. They provide a wide range of health promotion and screening activities and offer a compassionate bridge between the faith community and the health care system. The Nurse & Health Ministries Network serves as a resource and provides education, consultation, and support to promote this vital aspect of congregational life.

Accomplishments in 2007

- 240,500+ health interventions were provided in 2007 through the Network's 125 participating faith communities with active congregational health programs
- Assisted 17 additional congregations in developing congregational health programs
- Served as an information and referral network for parish/faith community nurses, clergy and community service providers – responding to over 2500 phone and e-mail contacts
- Sent a bi-monthly newsletter to 960+ people interested in congregational health programs
- Presented six Health & Wellness in Faith Communities Informational Sessions throughout the greater Phoenix area inspiring 60+ attendees
- Presented our annual conference, "Health Ministries: Advocating for Healthy Communities through the Life Span" with 75+ attendees
- Hosted the "Roadmap to Treatment" half-day conference/luncheon educating 45+ attendees
- Presented individual orientation &/or information sessions to an additional 11 people
- Provided training through our Faith Community Nurse Basic Preparation Course to 20 registered nurses
- Supplied continuing education through three monthly support / education groups (average attendance 27 people per month)
- Celebrated the people involved in congregational health programs with a Holiday Luncheon in December

A dynamic group of registered nurses attended Beatitudes Center DOAR's most recent Faith Community Nurse Basic Preparation Course, coordinated through our Nurse & Health Ministries Network. The nurses varied in age, experience, gender, and faith, and especially the settings in which they serve.

Jean Quarelli, RN felt very blessed to be able to attend this year's course. *"I found Basic Prep very helpful. I am learning a lot and look forward to learning more."*

Jean is in a unique situation as parish nurse at St. Francis Xavier Parish. Jean found out about the position in the fall of 2007, shortly after

her retirement. Jean now works 20 hours per week and is the only Order of Malta Parish Nurse in Arizona. Her position stemmed from a grant given by the Order's American Association to start a parish nurse program at St. Francis Xavier.

Her main focus as parish nurse is to concentrate on senior homebound parishioners. *"I love parish nursing. It's very different from the cardiac catheter lab where I spent the previous 23 years."* Jean has been involved with many grateful parishioners. For example, Juanita is in her 80's and has multiple health problems. On one visit, Jean noticed Juanita's house was not well equipped with safety devices; Jean arranged for their installation. Jean is also assisting Juanita in funeral planning – a need that surfaced through their conversations.

All of the congregations in our network have one thing in common; they have people with physical, emotional, social, and spiritual needs. The 125 congregations with which we network in the Valley are reaping the tremendous benefits of having congregational health programs in their places of worship.

Grandparents Raising Grandchildren

Project GrandCare offers assistance to grandparents raising their grandchildren and the children in their care, as well as other kinship caregivers. The program provides support / sharing groups, workshops, benefit and entitlement information, legal assistance, social opportunities, and respite care.

Accomplishments in 2007

- 6 ongoing support groups were held for 141 kinship caregivers
- 9th Annual Grandparent University and 5 workshops impacted 147 attendees
- Respite assisted 98 grandparents and 141 grandchildren with 2,290 days of supervised activity
- 890 callers received guidance through information and referral services
- Legal assistance benefited 74 families with 102 adults and 144 children
- 4 annual activities for participating families took place: a spring picnic, Grandparent's Day event at the AZ Diamondbacks Ball Park (Chase Field), and a holiday party, totaling 381 participants
- 3 social therapeutic outings (recreational events) and 6 social therapeutic meetings for grandchildren reached 150 total attendees

Maria Salaiz Valdez is an office administrator and receptionist for a Phoenix law office. However, her most important role in life is raising her four-year-old grandson. Maria first heard about Beatitudes Center DOAR and its Project GrandCare program when she picked up a flyer. *"I called and signed up to take their advocacy class."*

Maria admits that sometimes it's not easy raising a grandchild, which seems like *"starting all over with parenting."* However, when it became necessary for Maria to take her grandson under her wing, she didn't think twice about it. *"He's my youngest grandchild and my youngest son's only child. His*

mother has a drug problem and is unable to care for him," Maria explains. *"I love that little boy with all my heart."*

The most frustrating thing for Maria was a feeling of being totally helpless in the courts. In November, the courts insisted Maria give his mother another chance. *"That was hard. He's lived with me since before he was born, but he went to live with his mother and that was heartbreaking. Then she tested positive [for drugs] four times in one month. You just feel helpless."*

Maria's grandson was returned to her custody, and Maria has found friends and support with all the wonderful people she's met through Project GrandCare. *"Meeting Patricia from the staff was a blessing. All the 25 ladies in the advocacy group that I was in – all ages, different types and ethnicities – were there to care for our grandchildren. We get our questions answered plus a lot of help. Sometimes we have down days but those meetings are the get-away time. I've already signed up for the next series of classes."*

Caregivers

Generations coordinates support groups and workshops and provides information for persons concerned about aging loved ones. This program assists caregivers by helping them manage caregiver stress, explore the emotional aspects of caregiving, resolve family tensions, manage long-distance caregiving and access community resources.

Accomplishments in 2007

- Ongoing support groups met the needs of 525 attendees
- A new support group began at the Paradise Valley Community Center
- Caregiving 101 seminars assisted 40 people
- “Un Descansito” Spanish caregiver forums supported 152 participants
- An overnight caregiver retreat nurtured 24 attendees
- 600 caregiver booklets were distributed
- 650 bi-monthly Generations newsletters were distributed
- 8 presentations were made to community organizations
- Outreach efforts began to assist gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender caregivers
- 180 caregivers were assisted through information and referral calls
- A “Powerful Tools for Caregivers” series was presented in Phoenix

At the heart of Beatitudes Center DOAR’s Generations Program are the caregiver support groups we sponsor. Caregivers choose from Glendale, Scottsdale, Paradise Valley, Goodyear and Phoenix group locations. They face challenges related to Alzheimer’s disease, Parkinson’s disease, strokes, dementia, diabetes, or just the frailties that may come with aging. They are spouses, sons, daughters, grandchildren,

neighbors and friends. Their responsibilities may range from an occasional trip to the store, visiting a loved one in an assisted living facility, providing support as a long-distance caregiver, or giving round-the-clock, 24/7 in-home care.

Barb Franklin has come to our Saturday group for many years. Her mom died five years ago, and now Barb cares for her father. He is a charming gentleman with many health challenges. Barb is meeting these challenges with good grace, a sense of humor (so important to caregivers), and help from Beatitudes Center DOAR and others. Because of her experiences, Barb is also a valuable resource to others.

One of the most important things caregivers can do is to take care of themselves. Though this is often much easier said than done, Barb has learned. She attends a support group, and has taken part in our “Surviving the Holidays” seminar and caregiver retreats.

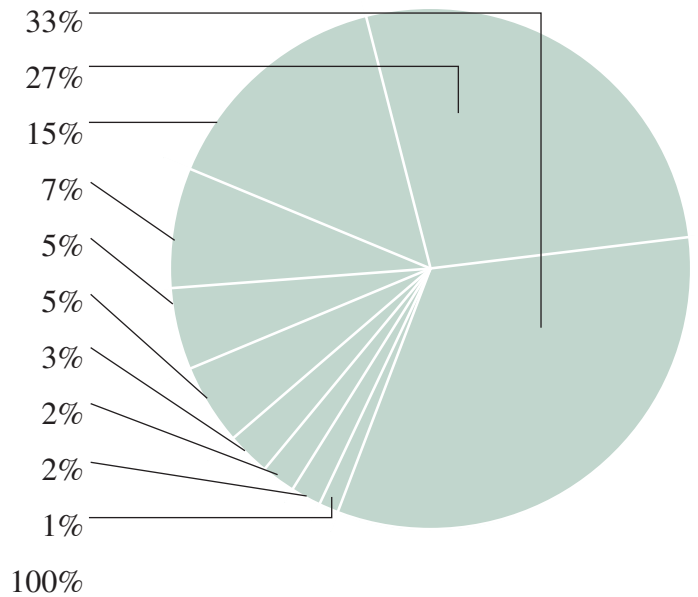
Barbara shares, *“My experience with the support group goes back almost ten years when I graduated from the U of A in May and instantly became my parents’ caregiver. I began attending the Saturday morning sessions with Donna Heppermann. I have found the greatest gift is the acceptance of other caregivers and the loss of isolation during the caregiving journey. Follow-up discussions are great too. The isolation disappears upon hearing similar stories happening in other families and we brainstorm together to help each other.”*

Beatitudes Center DOAR Fiscal Year 2007

Financial support to Beatitudes Center DOAR resulted in the equivalent of millions of dollars of service provided to people in need, including 38,846 hours of volunteer services to 749 homebound adults (with paid staff coordinating the program); 240,500+ health interventions; caregiver support to 525 support group attendees; 2,290 days of respite for grandparents raising grandchildren – and much more that is highlighted on the preceding pages. We are grateful to all supporters, volunteers, and community partners that made these services possible!

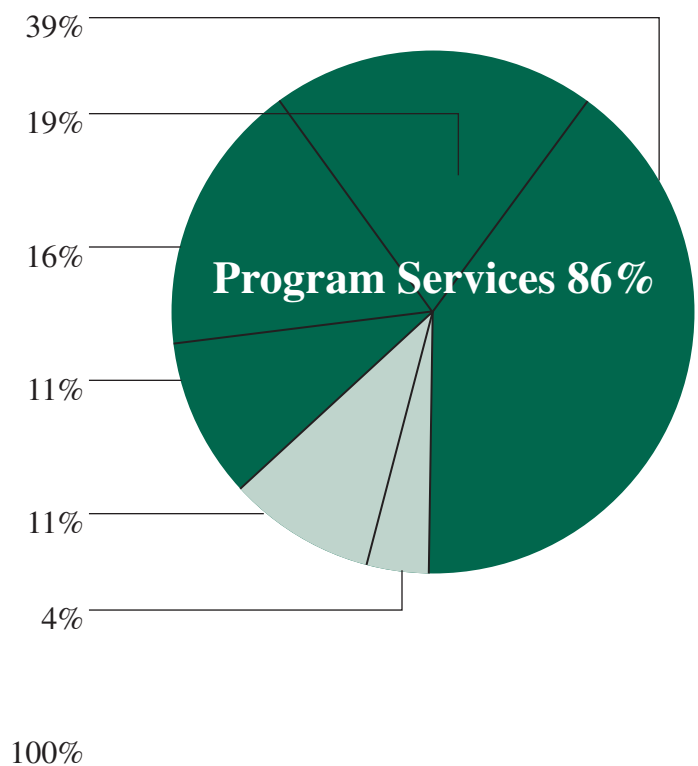
